Week One: The Founding Fathers and The Enlightenment Roy Porter's magnificent study of the Enlightenment in Great Britain entitled <u>THE CREATION</u>

OF THE MODERN WORLD is one of the best works on the subject. Try also Steven Pinker's ENLIGHTENMENT NOW.

Weeks Two: George Washington Many choices here. I would recommend <u>HIS EXCELLENCY GEORGE WASHINGTON</u> by Joseph Ellis, or Ron Chernow's monumental <u>WASHINGTON</u>: A LIFE.

Week Three: Alexander Hamilton For the ambitious reader, Chernow again wins the prize with his <u>ALEXANDER HAMILTON</u>. For a (much) shorter summary of Hamilton—and all of the Founders—see Gordon Wood, <u>REVOLUTIONARY</u> CHARACTERS: WHAT MADE THE FOUNDERS DIFFERENT.

Week Four: Benjamin Franklin Literally hundreds of bios of Dr. Franklin, but the two best current studies are by Walter Isaacson and H.W. Brands

Week Five: James Madison I would go with <u>JAMES MADISON</u> by Garry Wills. Brief and penetrating. For a more in-depth study see <u>JAMES MADISON</u> BY Ralph Ketcham.

Week Six: Forgotten Founders I used Craig Nelson's <u>THOMAS PAINE</u> while preparing this lecture, and found it to be very clear and entertaining. For a very readable and humorous look at the life of the Marquis de Layayette, check out Sarah Vowell's <u>LAFAYETTE IN THE SOMEWHAT UNITED STATES</u>. To learn more about Aaron Burr, see Nancy Isenberg's <u>FALLEN FOUNDER</u>.

NOTE: ANYTHING by Gordon Wood or Joseph Ellis on the Revolution/Founders era will be most helpful.
