HAPPY ANNIVERSARY OLLI@SSU!

OLLI at SSU is celebrating its 19th anniversary this month. Sonoma State University was the second Osher Lifelong Learning Institute to be established, with the University of Southern Maine as the first OLLI campus. We can thank the Osher Foundation in San Francisco, Ed Stolman, a successful businessman from Sonoma, and the Fromm Institute at the University of San Francisco for our beginnings in 2001. Alfred and Hanna Fromm created one of the earliest programs of lifelong learning: the Fromm Institute at the University of San Francisco. In Fromm's autobiography, he stated there are three things important in daily life: "the importance of learning, strong family bonds, and charity." To this day, the Fromm Institute serves over 1,000 older adults in the San Francisco Bay Area. How does this relate to SSU? Ed Stolman was active at the Fromm Institute, and when he moved to Sonoma, his goal was to start a lifelong learning program at Sonoma State University. Ed Stolman provided initial funding and later involved Bernard Osher and the Bernard Osher Foundation, where the SSU Osher Lifelong Learning Institute received an initial grant of \$100,000 in June 2001 and has continued to receive funding from the Foundation.

Over 124 Osher Lifelong Learning Institutes have been established at universities throughout the United States in the last 20 years. California has 25 Osher Lifelong Learning Institutes from Humboldt State to the north and from San Diego State University to the south, with 14 located on Cal State University campuses. It is because of the generous funding of the Osher Foundation that SSU campuses throughout the country share the joy of lifelong learning.

As we enter our 20th year at Sonoma State University, we can celebrate the many friends, instructors, staff, and volunteers that have been a part of Sonoma State University's OLLI history. We are excited to plan for our 20th Anniversary year and hope you will join us in our celebration with dynamic courses, inspiring instructors, exciting activities to renew and expand friendships, and more importantly, celebrating each other. IN MEMORIAM

Charles A. Dunkel

A former resident of Oakmont, California, Charles A. Dunkel, also known as Chuck, passed away on August 19. Chuck grew up in Royal Oak, Michigan, a suburb of Detroit. Chuck graduated with a B.A. degree in economics from Williams College in Williamstown, Massachusetts, and later received an MBA at the University of Chicago, School of Business. He served in the U.S. Air Force and honorably discharged in 1967. Chuck later earned his Juris Doctorate from the University of Michigan, and after graduation, Chuck moved to San Francisco, passed the California State Bar, and worked for two large bank trust departments in the Bay Area, then worked for 22 years with the Federal Reserve Bank trust department. Chuck is

survived by his wife and love of 25 years, Suzanne Cassell. Chuck retired in 2005 and he and Suzanne moved to Oakmont where they enjoyed OLLI classes for many years. He and Suzanne loved to travel, attend Santa Rosa Symphony Concerts, and were members of the Episcopalian St. Patrick church in Kenwood.

Mary Shilts Boster

Mary Shilts Boster, a native of Ohio and 42-year resident of Rohnert Park, California, passed away in Albany, California on August 15 at the age of 100. Mary was the wife of a diplomat, and lived abroad in seven countries, including Russia, Germany, Poland, and Bangladesh. She and her husband Gene were posted in Moscow twice during the Cold War, first during Stalin's era, and then again in Brezhnev's. She traveled with two young children to Moscow in 1948 and worked in the U.S. Embassy. Mary moved to California in 1976 and made her way to Rohnert Park in 1978 and lived there until recently. Mary majored in English literature with minors in biology and French literature and has always been a lifelong

learner and traveled to more than 100 countries into her late 90's. Mary had great many life experiences, including her first flight on a Goodyear Blimp while in her teens, and trekking through the Himalayas in the 1960s. She climbed to 16,000 feet to the Khumbu Glacier on Mount Everest, and barely missed a flood while hiking to Machu Picchu in Peru on her 75th birthday. Mary was an adventurer and was always planning her next trip. Mary is survived by her five children, 8 grandchildren, and 10 great grandchildren.
