INSTRUCTOR HIGHLIGHT – CARLOS TORRES

Carlos Torres has just recently started teaching for OLLI after many years of teaching undergraduates. He currently serves in five different departments at SSU including Liberal Studies, Anthropology, Native American Studies and at Berkeley and SSU Extended Ed departments. Carlos' experience is vast, from working in the restaurant industry to real estate to academics. At fifteen years old he had the dream of becoming a professor and went back to college in his late thirties to make this dream a reality. He received his Ph.D. from the University of Colorado at Boulder.



Carlos worked for 30 plus years in the restaurant industry, serving more than fifty restaurants, a favorite being Gustaf Anders in Orange County. Another favorite is The Girl and the Fig in Sonoma. He brings a unique perspective, paralleling his work experience to academic experience. Gourmet Swedish food is one of his all-time favorites. Carlos commented that food relates so deeply to culture. He noted that he enjoys anything cooked in a wood burning oven with fresh herbs and oils. Carlos' favorite wine is a GSM, which is a blend of Grenache, Syrah and Mourvèdre. He even traveled to France to find one.

Carlos noted that OLLI students are getting a sneak peek to areas he wants to open up research in. If he has a current curiosity or enthusiasm towards a particular topic, OLLI classes are a great way to explore with current research. He enjoys that the OLLI audience is wise and invested. Carlos truly does have an Insiders perspective on the Food and Wine Industry, noting that food itself is the first and most important highway for cultural exchange in the world. He is in the process of writing a book called “Cultivating Human” that will teach the legacy of our communication.




