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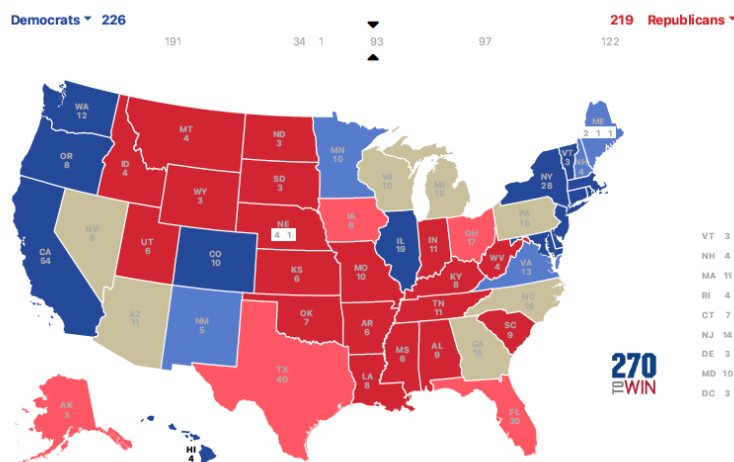

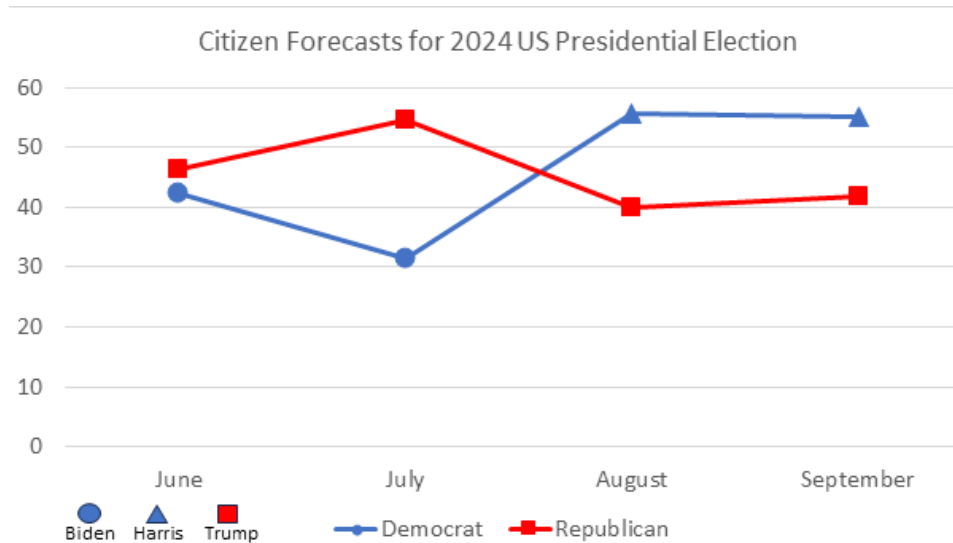
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Another Way to Go...

 - There is much less under-sampling of Trump voters & sentiment than in 2016 and 2020.

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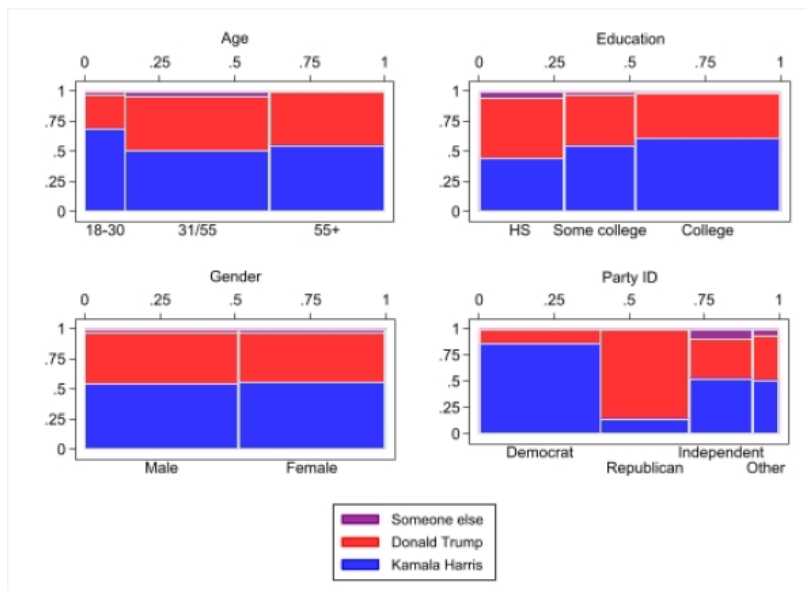
Do “The People” Know Better Than the Scholars?!

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Disinformation as a Part of “Conflict” – Hybrid(-ized) Conflict & the Demise of “War”

The argument is this:

- Nowadays hybrid warfare (other names – proxy war, non-linear war, soft power theory, chaos theory, synergetic, dissipative structure theory, systematic theory) is the way we conduct power relations in the post-9/11 era.
- Hybrid conflict/warfare does not absolutely enable the definition and use of “aggression” as conceived under the UN General Assembly in 1974, Article 1.
- Aggression is the use of the force of arms against sovereignty, territorial integrity and political independence of another state or any other way, contradictory to UN Charter, as it is defined in the current definition.
- Aggression and force become fungible concepts in this realm.

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What is Hybrid Conflict? Theoretical Base

Hybrid Conflict combines elements of an insurgency, along with nation-building, sectarian strife, and domestic Terrorism.

Hybrids are likely to pose challenges for Alliances & cooperation, with multiple actors & decision-makers involved.

A “strategic dilemma” is created because our presence is likely to exacerbate rather than improve the given situation.

Q.: Are there violent and non-violent aspects of hybrids?

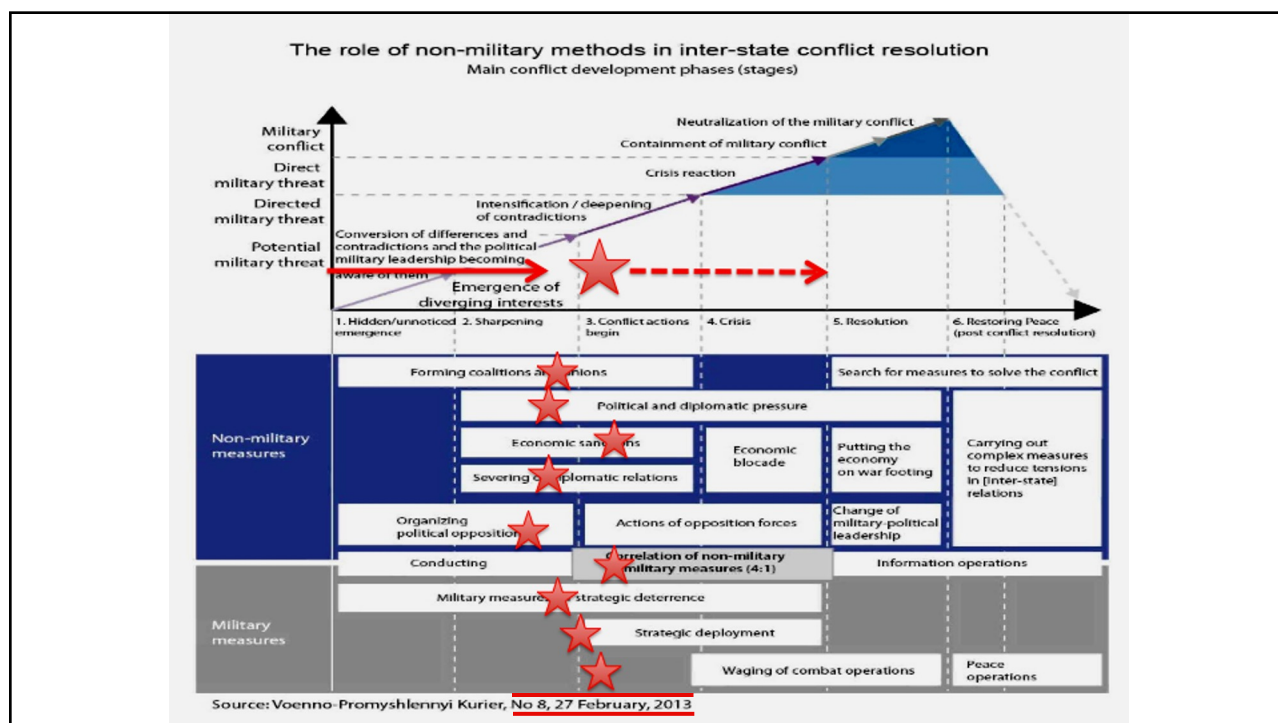
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How Hybrid Warfare Can Work: An Example

- According to this definition:
 - **Information is the “currency” of this type of conflict;**
 - The “psychological aspect” of the warfare is planned in accordance with public relations scenarios.
 - Can include the leakage of misinformation and its presentation in a positive light allowing for the distortion and differing assessments of what is happening;
 - This can demoralize citizens; lead to negative feelings, and in the short run, provides defection to the side of the informational aggressor.
 - Sound familiar at all to you? Recall this? Recall how and what has occurred / is occurring in the Ukraine?

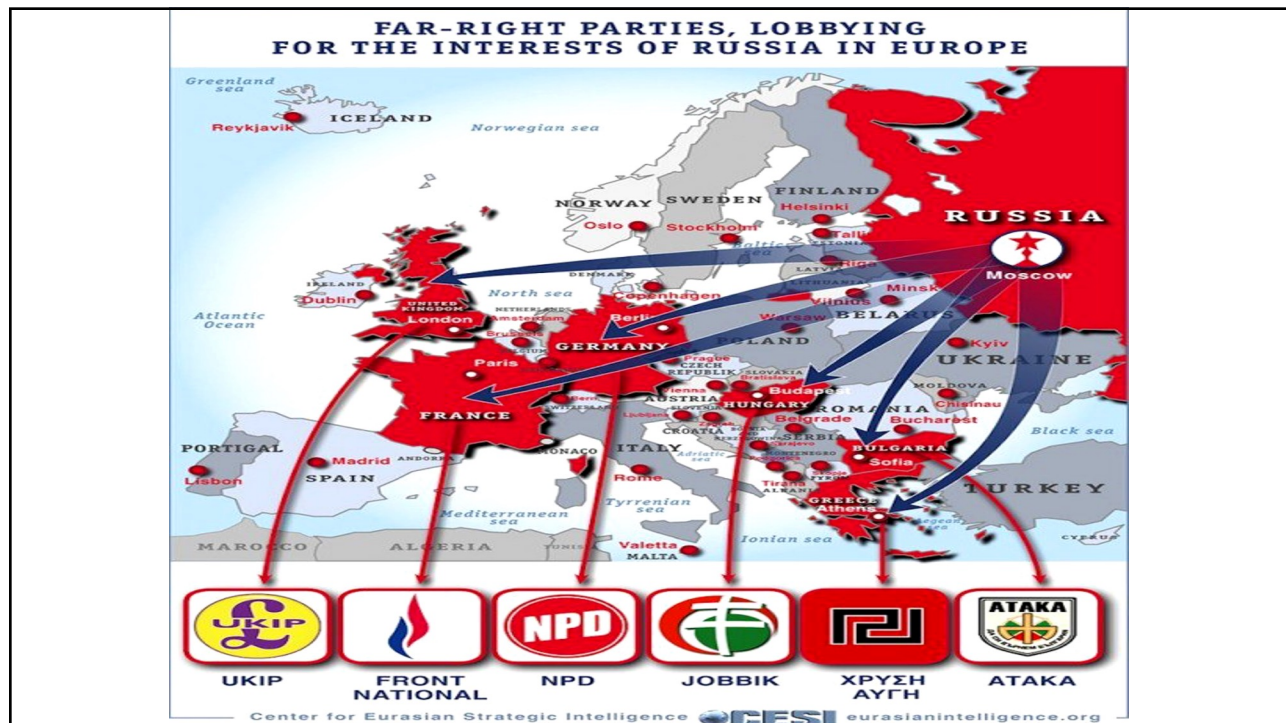

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How This Can Work – in the Politics of the U.S.

- Take a recent publication – still available on [Facebook](#), yet taken down in the regular
- *DC Weekly* isn't a published newspaper, it only exists online. It comes from Moscow and is run by John Mark Dougan, an American ex-cop, who fled to Moscow when he was investigated by the FBI in 2016, and runs a network of AI-powered fake news sites like the *Houston Post*, *Chicago Crier*, *Boston Times*, etc. in addition to *DC Weekly*.
- They use fake American sounding names and include photo's of real Americans with the fake names, like a story attributed to a journalist "Jessica Devlin", who doesn't seem to exist as a journalist and whose picture was actually Judy Batalion, an American author.
- Recently posted an article from the *Chicago Chronicle*, a newspaper that went out of business in 1908.

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Take Out Your Website Laundry!

The Information Laundromat is a lead generation tool used to determine if and how websites share architecture and content. It provides two core functions: content similarity and domain forensics matching

Track content relationships from across the infosphere

Enter a URL, the title, or a snippet of text from an article to search for instances of reposted or similar articles that appear on search engines, the GDELT database, or a plagiarism detection tool. Searching by URL automatically parses the title and content, but this feature does not work on all sites. Title and content can be specified using `_title:` or `_content:`. Accuracy varies with text length and uniqueness; common phrases like "Vladimir Putin" yield less precise results.

Call this a laundromat that provides two core functions: **content similarity** and **website domain forensics matching**

THIS ALLOWS US TO COMPARE INFORMATION AND MANIPULATION OF WEBSITES CONTENT BY OUTSIDE SOURCES AND UNMASKING THEIR METADATA USE;

THIS ALLOWS US TO CREATE “TIERS” FOR WEBSITES AND INFORMATION THAT APPEARS ON WEBPAGES.

Guarding the US Election Against Russian Information Laundering

About the Dashboard

In May 2024, ASD, along with our partners at the Institute for Strategic Dialogue and the University of Amsterdam, published a report documenting roughly 400 domains—ranging from mirror sites and content aggregators to faux local news outlets and sites ostensibly focused on spirituality and men's interests—that republished articles that were identical or nearly identical to those that originated on Russian state media outlet RT.com. That report highlighted the urgent need for an ongoing monitoring system to detect websites laundering content from Russian state media outlets—particularly those targeting audiences in the United States.

To that end, we have paired two of ASD's tools: the Hamilton 2.0 dashboard, which tracks, among other things, articles published by Russian state-controlled media outlets, and the Information Laundromat, a tool that can help detect duplicate or near-duplicate content on the open web.

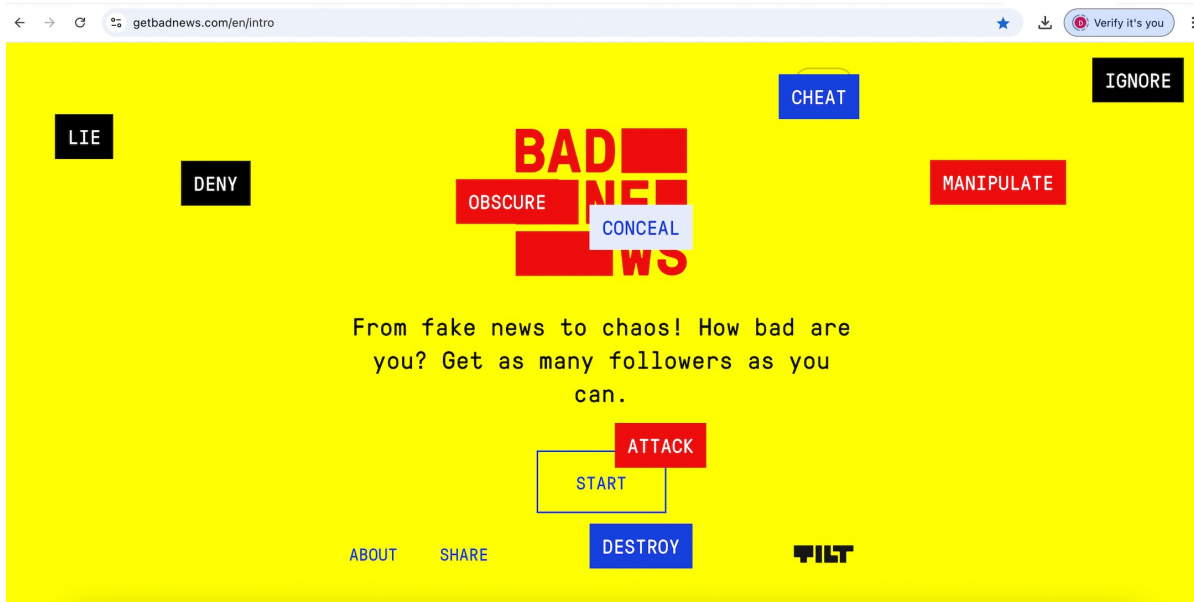
This dashboard aims, in part, to help secure the 2024 US elections by providing near real-time insights into how Russian state-sponsored propaganda infiltrates and influences our digital information environment. By monitoring where content from RT and RT en Español is being republished or amplified across the open web, this system can identify Russian content laundering sites before they reach a wider audience in the United States. This will allow stakeholders to implement countermeasures, including but not limited to flagging content for fact-checkers or raising public awareness about websites acting as fronts for Russian propaganda.

In this critical election, every narrative and piece of information can impact voter perceptions and behavior. This tool is a frontline defense against foreign information manipulation undermining the democratic process.

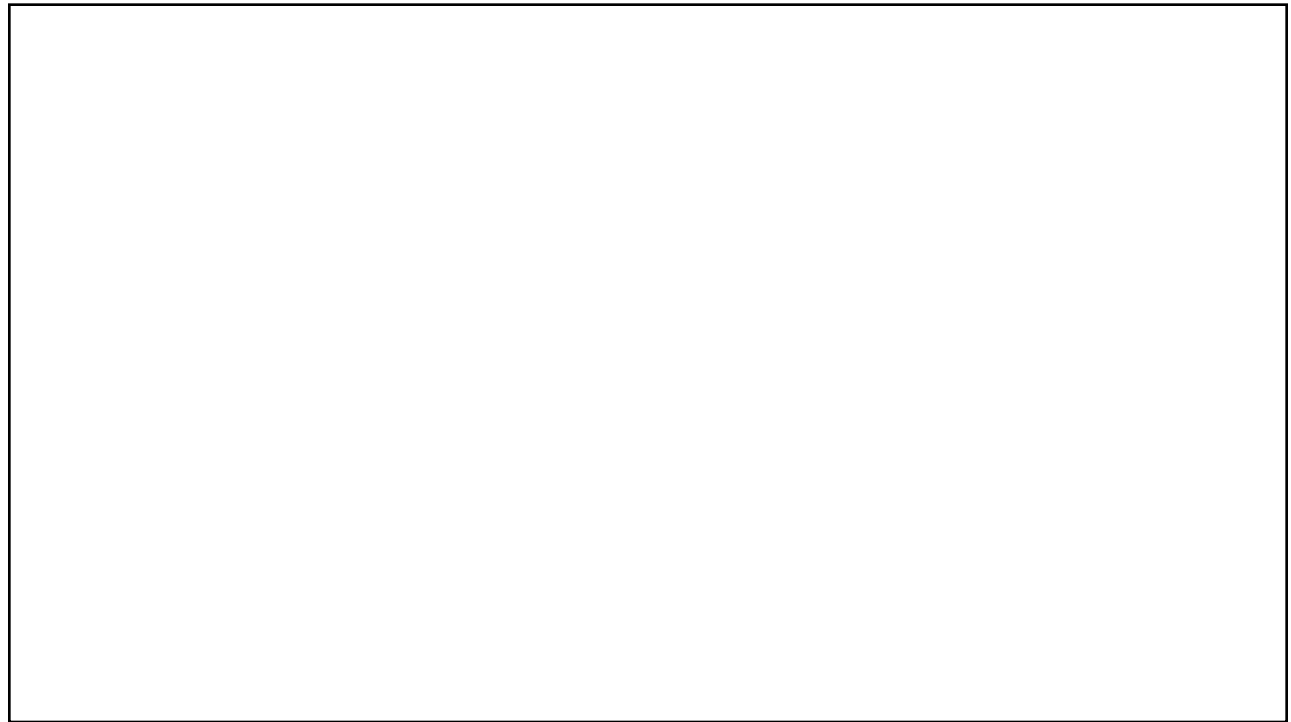

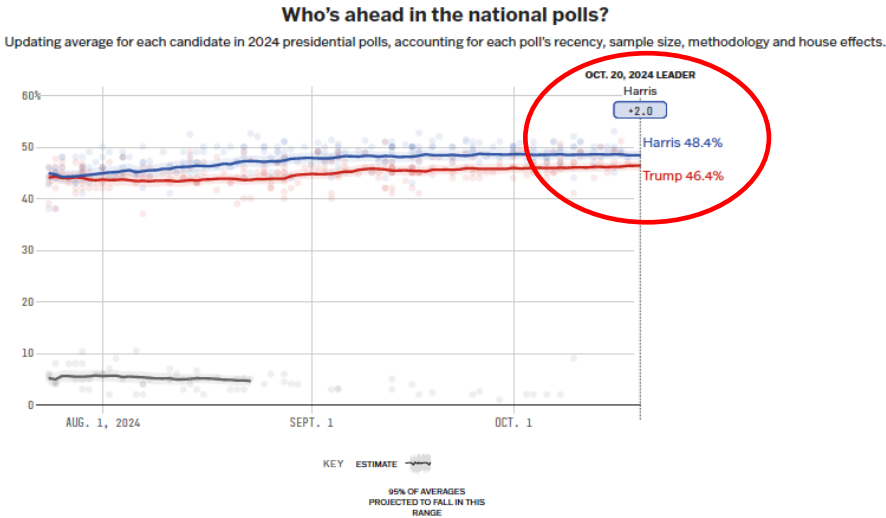
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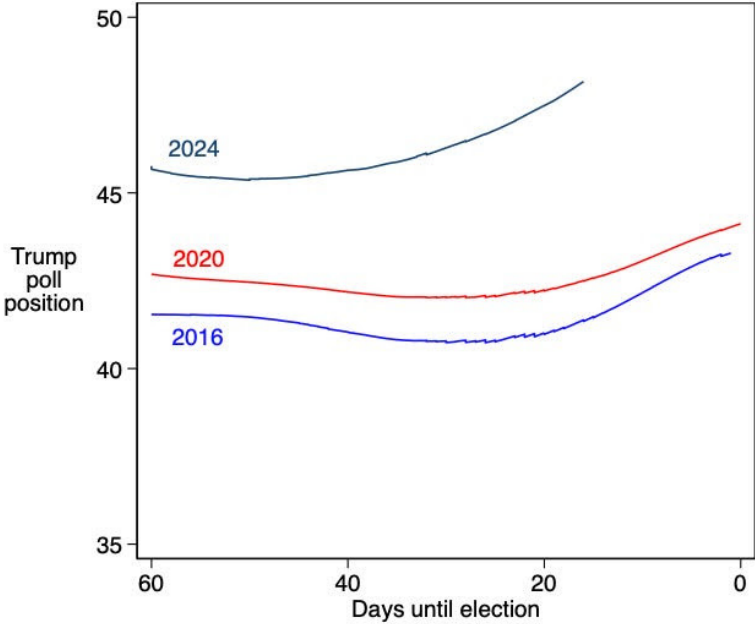
Some Numbers to Consider: This Race Has Tightened

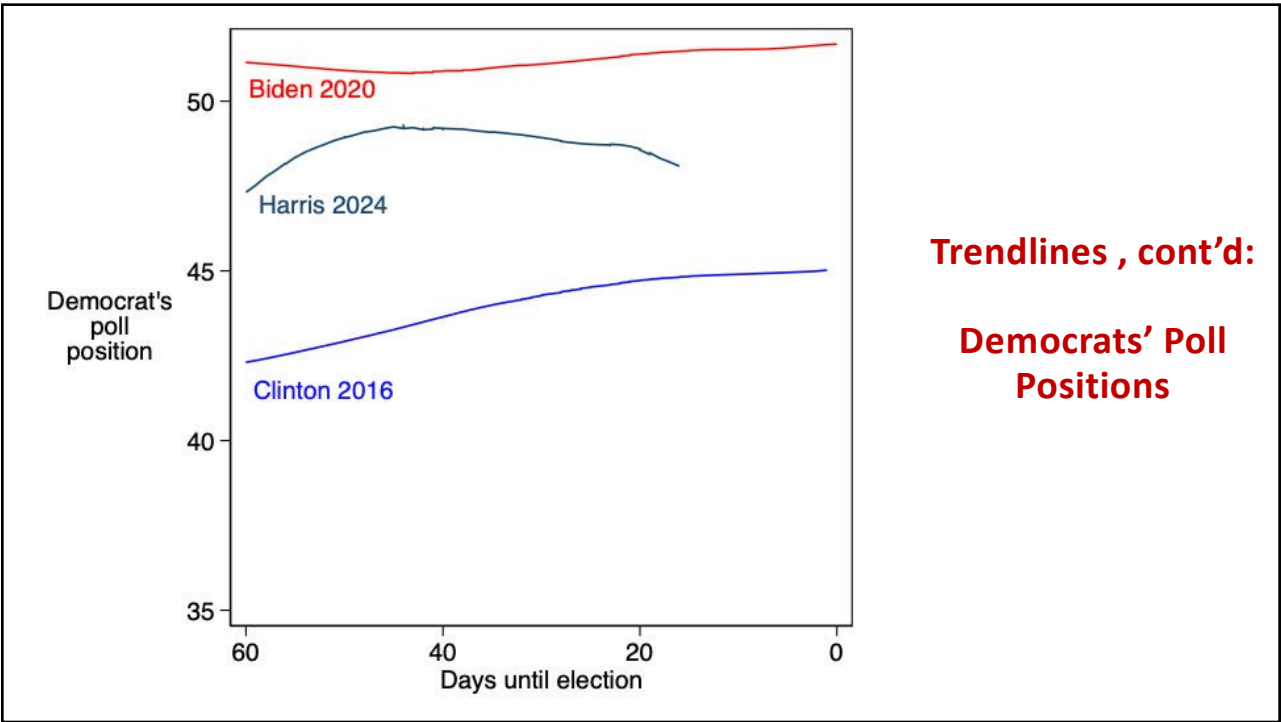

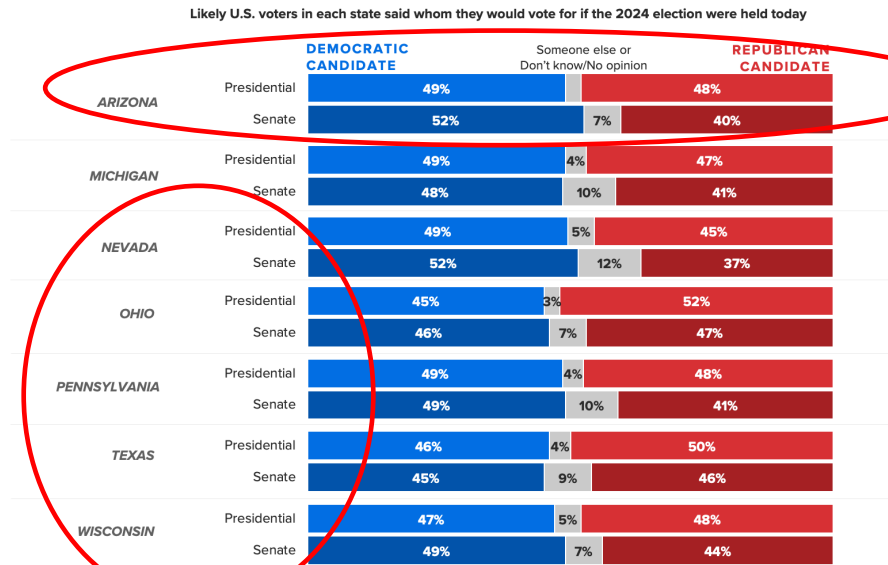

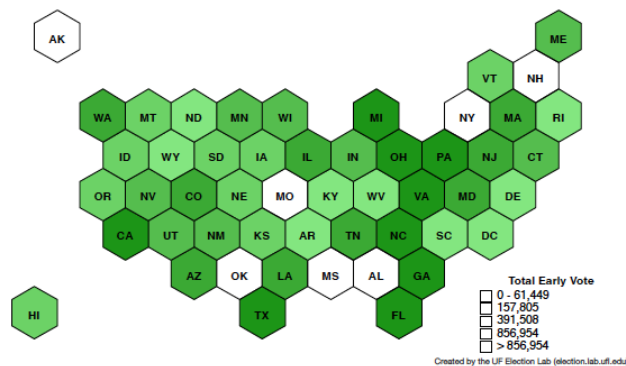

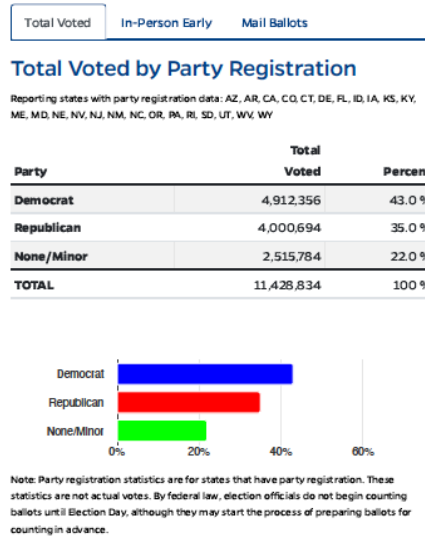

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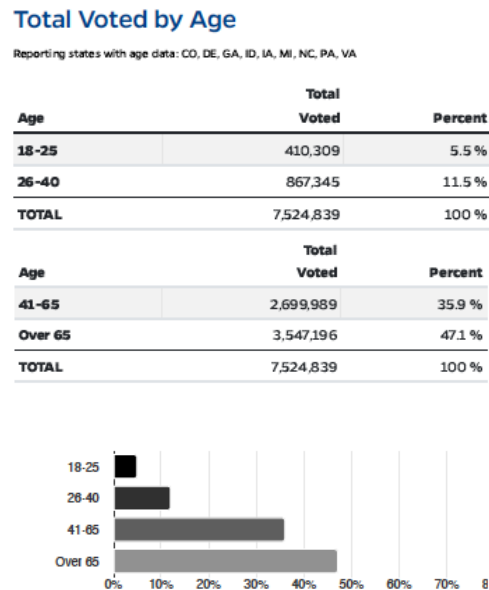

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With Early Voting, cont'd, by Age



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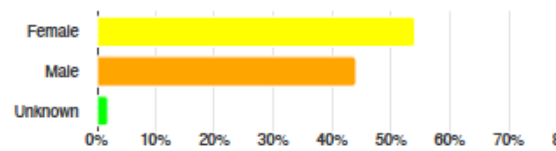

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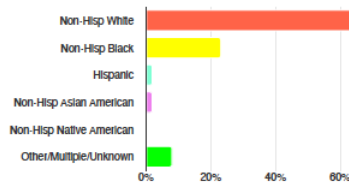

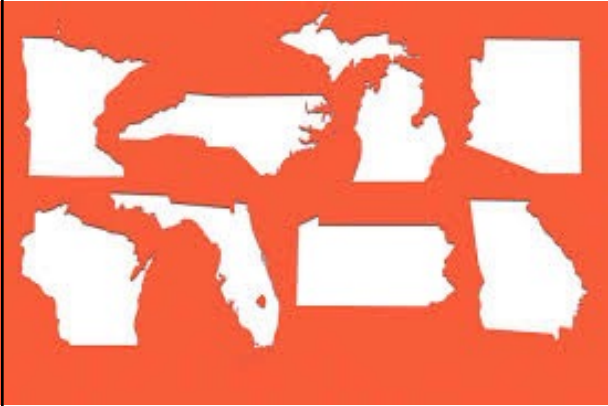

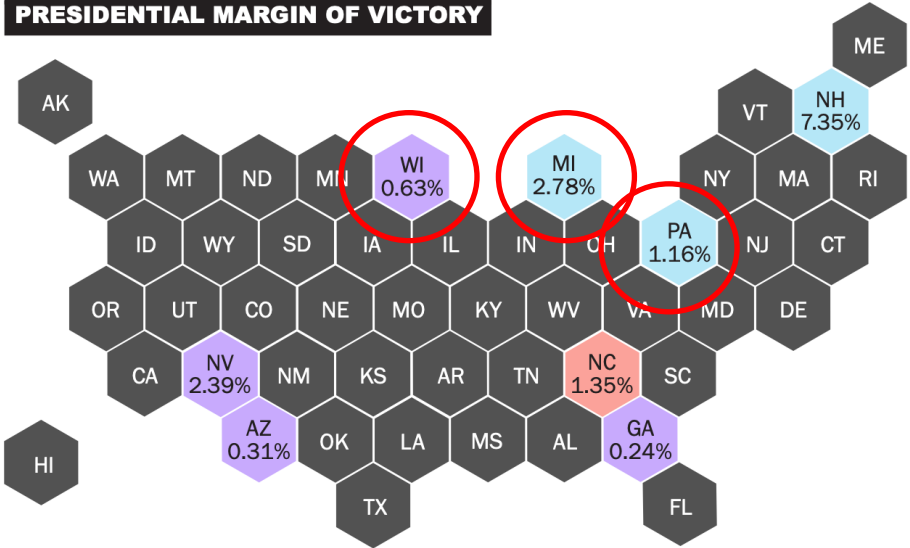

Here's What to Consider – Among Seven "Swing" States

- Total of 93 EV (Electoral Votes) across these 7 states
- Dems control Governorships in 5 of 7 = 71 Electoral Votes
(AZ; MI; NC; PA; WI)
- GOP controls Governorships in 2 of 7 = 22 Electoral Votes
(GA; NV)
- Yet, both AZ (11) and GA (16) are trending RED = 27 EVs
- 71 – 27 = 44 Dem Swings vs. 27 GOP Swings (one can add NV's 6 EVs to either)

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Counties Matter...Just Not ALL Counties!

- There are 3,100 counties in the USA;
- Here is what to pay attention to:
 - Somewhere between 8 to 11 counties are truly PURPLE and determine the split to a Presidential Candidate x their "size" (density)
 - There are 15 to 20 TOTAL COUNTIES that constitute "hues of purple overall" – NOTE: double this number of counties in a Midterm Election
- There are EIGHT TYPES of COUNTIES in the "USA Electoral Map"

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It Is The Counties That Matter...Just Not *ALL* Counties!

REMEMBER - There are *EIGHT TYPES of COUNTIES* in the “USA Electoral Map”

- The DOZEN COUNTIES THAT MATTER, OVERALL:*
- In PA: 1. Northampton County; 2. Erie County; 3. Bucks County;
- In AZ: 4. Maricopa County; 5. Pima County;
- In GA: 6. Fulton County; 7. Gwinnett County;
- In MI: 8. Kent County; 9. Oakland County;
- In NV: 10. Clark County; 11. Washoe County;
- In WI: 12. Waukesha County; 13. Dane County.

NOTES:

*NOTE I often do not include Allegheny and/or Erie Counties (PA). In some models / cases, have added them to the Models. Depends on some other factors.

Used to include Counties in OH and CO and sometimes even FL...I do so less often these days.

And Cobb and Gwinnett are basically the same thing demographically and politically, so that's like another half of one.

Additional ones to add can include: Wake (NC); Wayne (Mich.); Brown (WI); Lackawanna (PA); Miami-Dade (FL); and Douglas (which most of NE-2).

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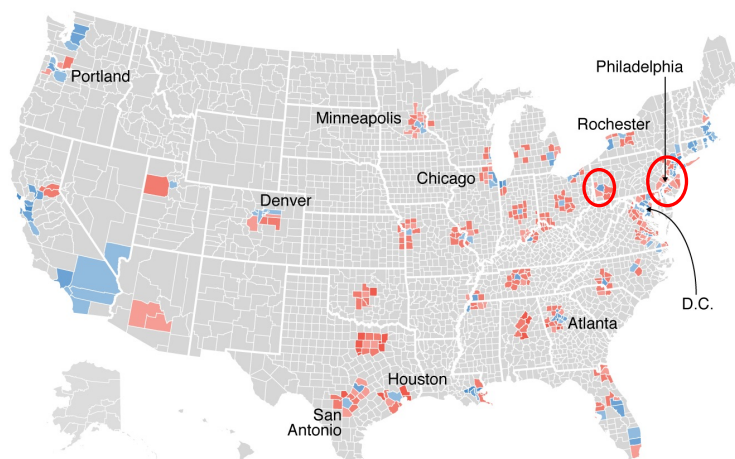

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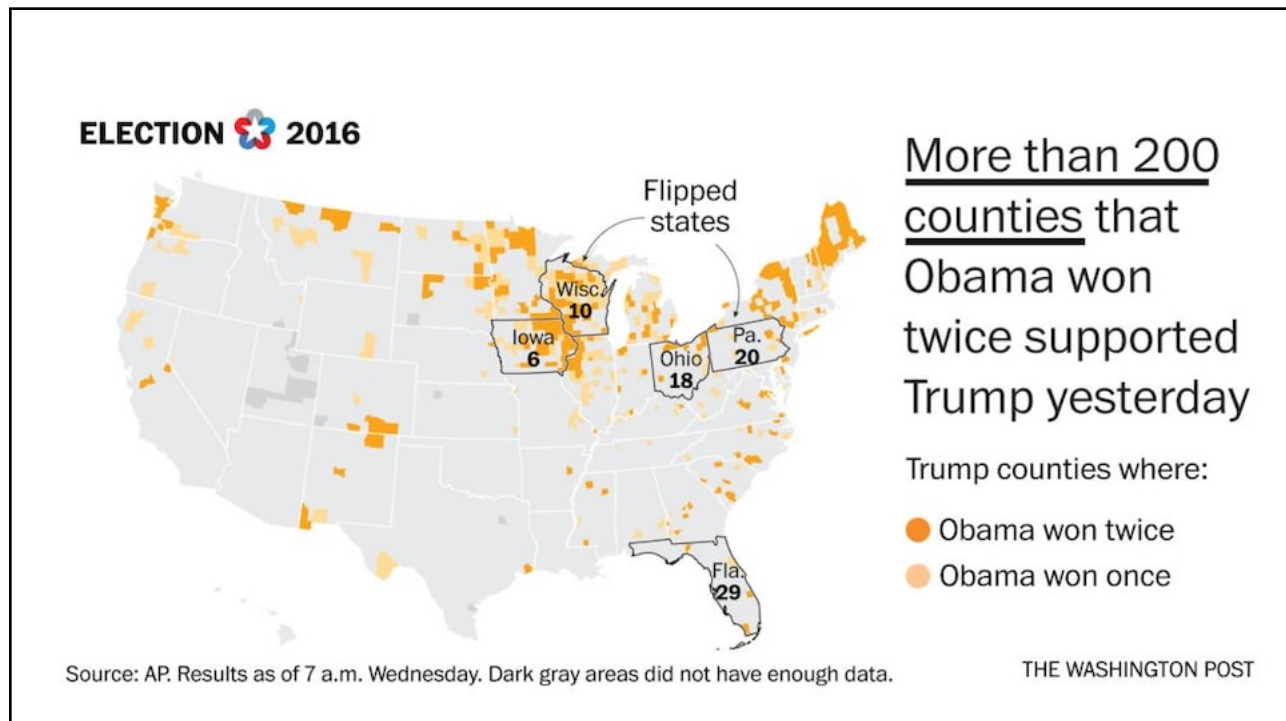
Where is The Vote? Punctuated by the “Swingers” – O-O-T-T Voters



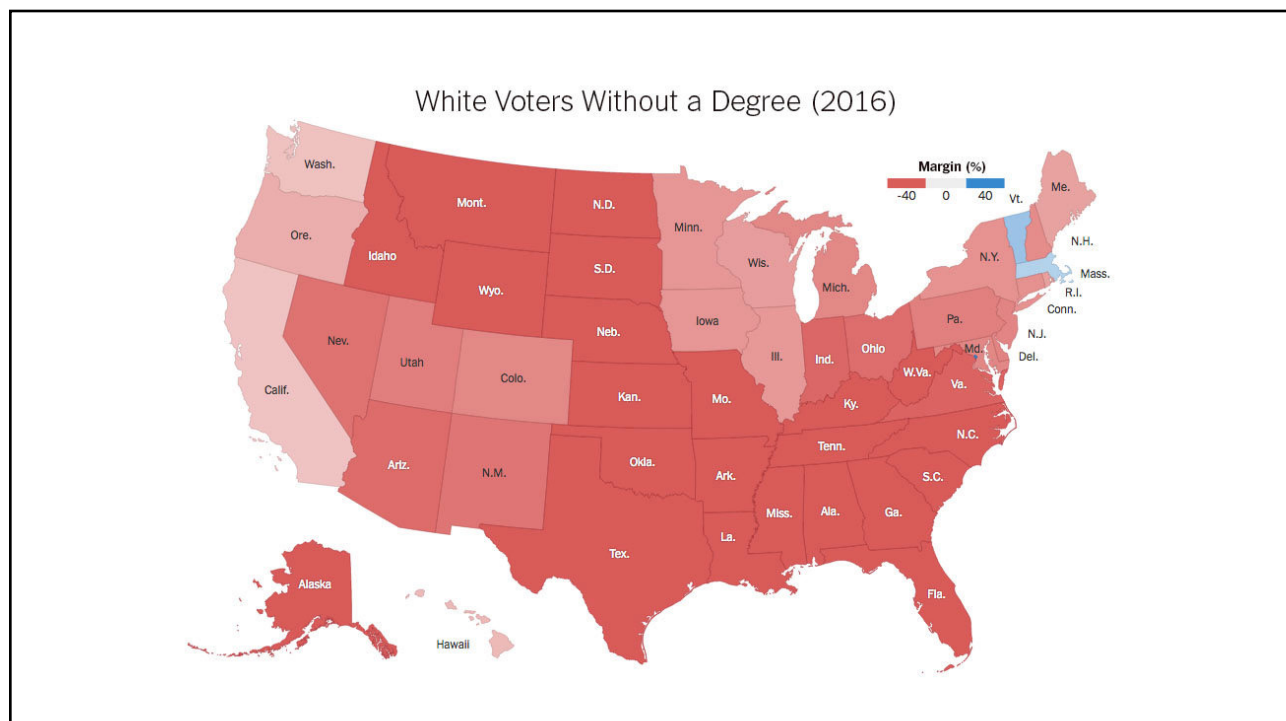

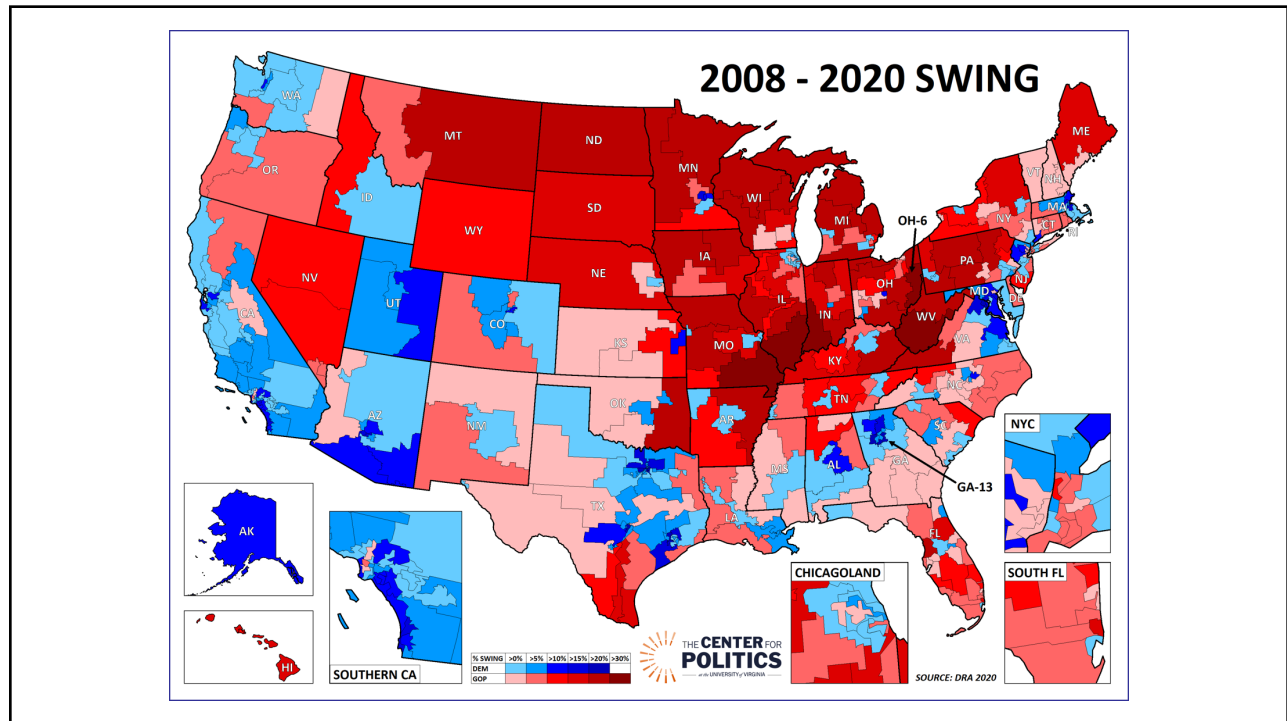
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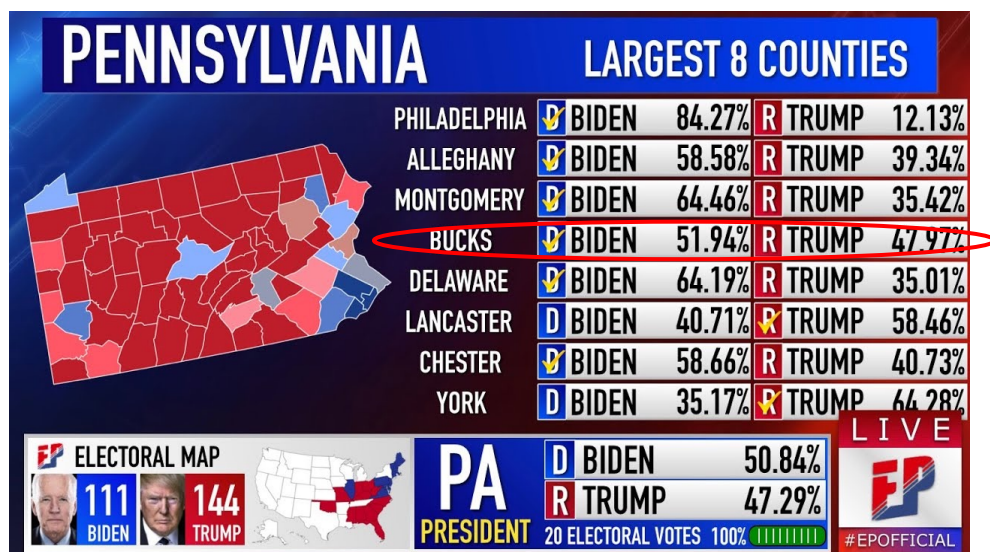


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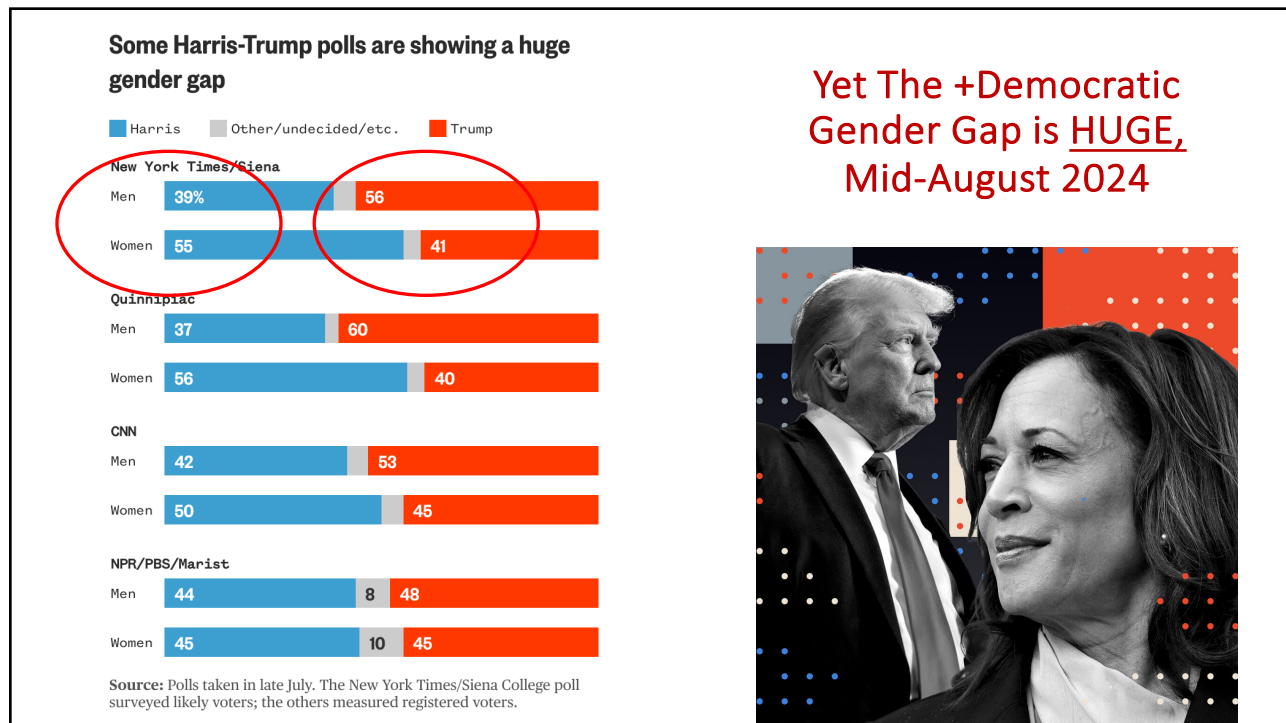


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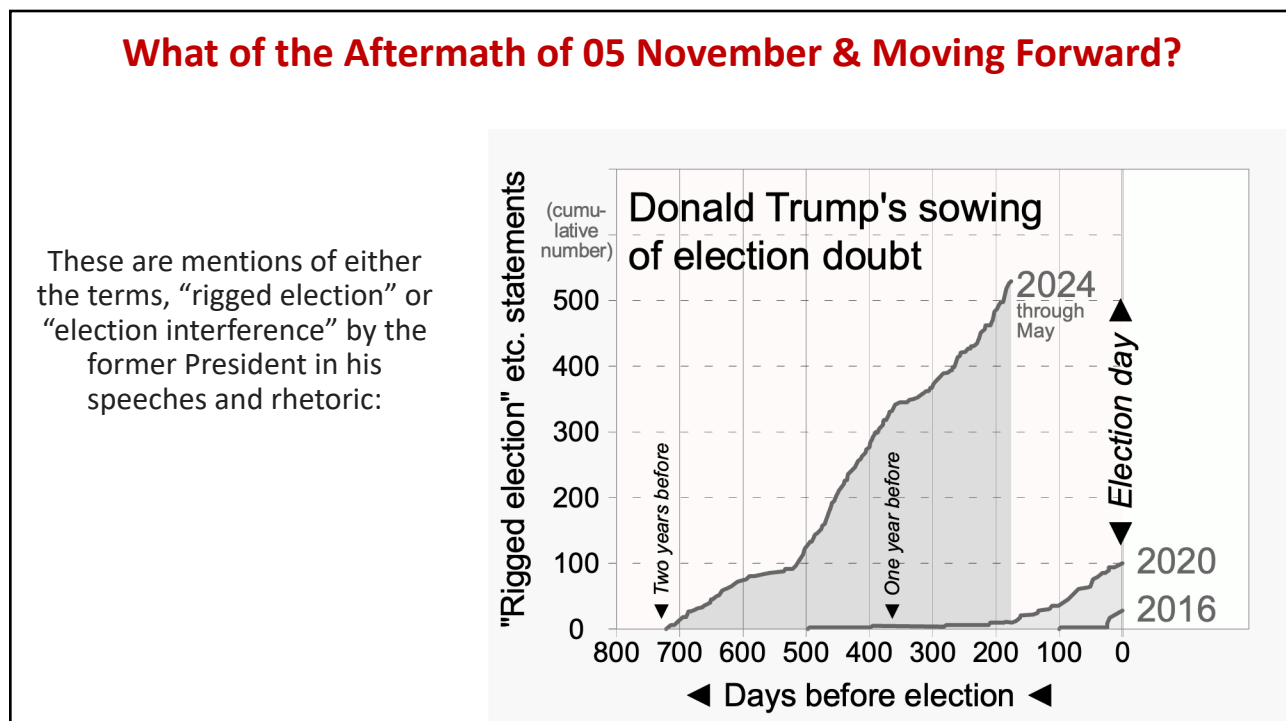
This Misses TWO KEY Counties – They Are...?



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The Tinderbox of Chaos Election That is Ahead



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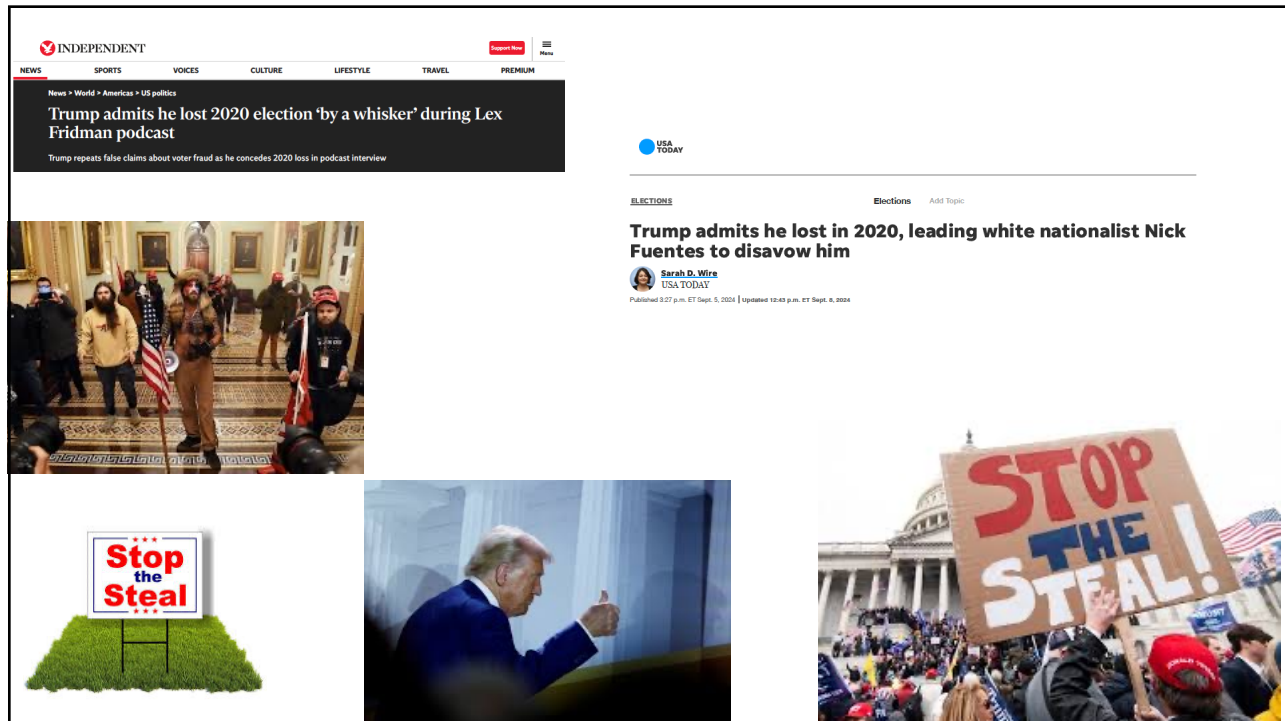
The Five Conditions for Chaos

All of this = a play for exploiting our on-going, existing divisions within our Body Politic.

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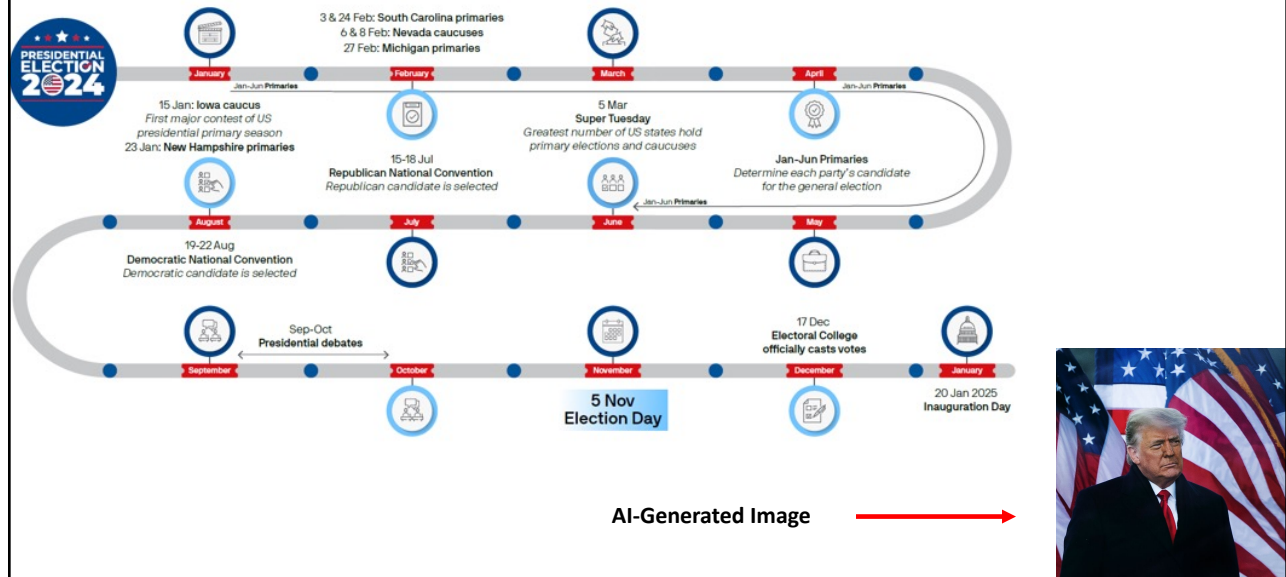


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The Timeline of Events That Are Still Unfolding...

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Time Frames	Election Events
The Year Before: March-May	This is generally the time when candidates register with the Federal Election Commission to run for president. There is not a federal deadline to register, but there are other requirements. Candidates announce their intentions to run, though some may do so earlier.
The Year Before: August-December	Primary and caucus debates take place. Normally, held by major networks. Certain polling requirements may be in place for a candidate to be invited. Optional step for some candidates.
Election Year: January to August of election year	States and political parties hold presidential primaries and caucuses (Super Tuesday). This determines the front runner ahead of Party conventions. Parties do not have to hold primaries on the same date for each state.
Election Year: July to September	Parties hold nominating conventions (DNC, RNC) to choose their presidential candidates.
Election Year: September and October	Republican and Democrat candidates participate in presidential debates. Third parties can be included based on the requirements set by the debate host.
Election Year: November	Election Day is the first Tuesday after the first Monday.
Election Year: December	Electors cast their votes for president in the Electoral College.
Next Calendar Year: January 6	Congress counts the electoral votes.
Next Calendar Year: January 20	Inauguration Day

General Presidential Election Timeline

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*By December 11, 2024—deadline for issuing and sending Certificates of Ascertainment
(at least six days before meeting of the electors)*

As soon as election results are final:

- [Prepare](#) your Certificates of Ascertainment.
- [Send](#) ONE (1) Certificate of Ascertainment to the Archivist of the United States.
- [Retain](#) SIX (6) original Certificates of Ascertainment to provide to the electors for the meeting of the electors.

Note: Federal law prescribes an expedited procedure for resolving disputes before this deadline (see 3 U.S.C. §5).

*December 17, 2024—electors vote
(the first Tuesday after second Wednesday in December)*

The electors in each State meet to select the President and Vice President of the United States.

- [Prepare](#) your Certificates of Vote.
- [Pair](#) with retained Certificates of Ascertainment.
- [Send](#) your paired Certificates of Ascertainment and Vote.

*By December 25, 2024—electoral votes must arrive
(no later than the fourth Wednesday in December)*

Designated Federal and State officials [must receive the paired Certificates](#) no later than the fourth Wednesday in December.

DATES of General Interest

On or before January 3, 2025—Archivist transfers Certificates to Congress

As the new Congress assembles, the Archivist transmits sets of Certificates to Congress, as requested. This generally happens when the Senate does not receive its set of Certificates on time. The transfer occurs in late December or early January when OFR's Legal staff meets with representatives of the Secretary of the Senate, the Clerk of the House, and Congressional Parliamentarians.

January 6, 2025—Congress counts electoral votes

Congress meets in joint session to count the electoral votes (unless Congress passes a law to change the date).

The President of the Senate, the Archivist of the United States, and other designated Federal and State officials must have the electoral votes in hand at this time.

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The “Contingent Election” Electoral College Process

- Calendars, dates [matter](#)...
- In every Presidential election since 1824, once it was known who had won the electoral votes of each state, one candidate has always had the required majority of electoral votes.
- If and when it happens that no candidate wins the required majority [at present 270] of electoral votes, there will be a (prospective) Electoral College deadlock that must be resolved through the contingent procedure.
- Electoral College deadlock can result from either of two circumstances:
 - An electoral vote tie (269 to 269) between two (major party) candidates, or
 - A multi-candidate election in which a third (etc.) candidate wins some electoral votes, with the result that even the leading candidate fails to win 270 electoral votes.

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The “Contingent Election,” cont’d

- In the event of Electoral College deadlock, the “contingent procedure” comes into effect, i.e.,
 - The Presidential election is thrown into the *House of Representatives*,
 - voting by *state delegations* (one state, one vote)
 - from among the top *three* candidates; and
 - The Vice Presidential election is thrown into the Senate,
 - voting by individuals
 - from among the top *two* candidates.
 - In each House, balloting continues until a candidate receives the required majority, which at the present time is
 - 26 states in the House and
 - 51 Senators.

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The “Contingent Election,” cont’d

- What would happen if the popular vote produced such a tie?
- Despite the electoral vote tie, one or other candidate would be the “popular vote winner,” most likely by a small but fairly clear margin (e.g., 100,000+ votes).
 - This fact would attract a lot of attention and produce some expectation that the popular vote winner should become president.
- One or more “faithless electors” might break the tie [when electoral votes are cast on December 17, 2024](#).
 - Should there be such “faithless electors,” they would probably be electors pledged to vote for the “popular vote loser” who instead would vote for the “popular vote winner.”
 - But contemporary party polarization probably makes such defections unlikely.
 - Moreover, the actions of electors would likely be influenced by expectations concerning the prospective outcome under the contingent procedure.

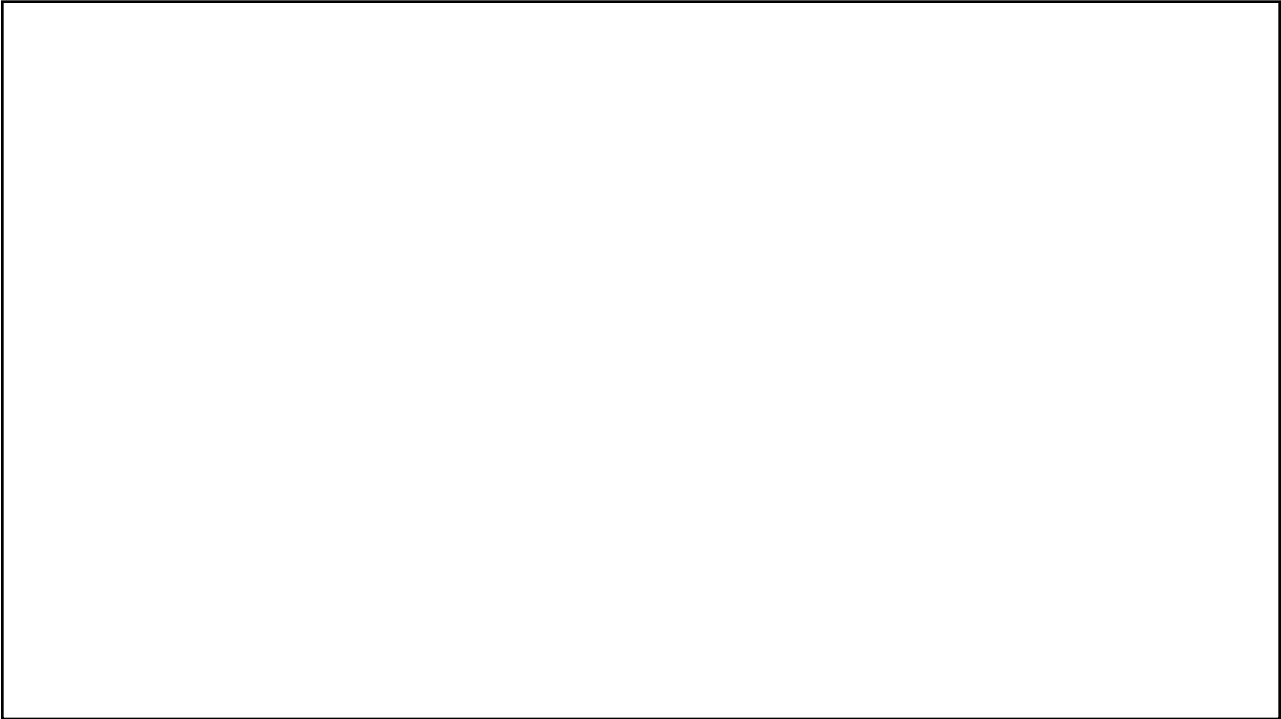

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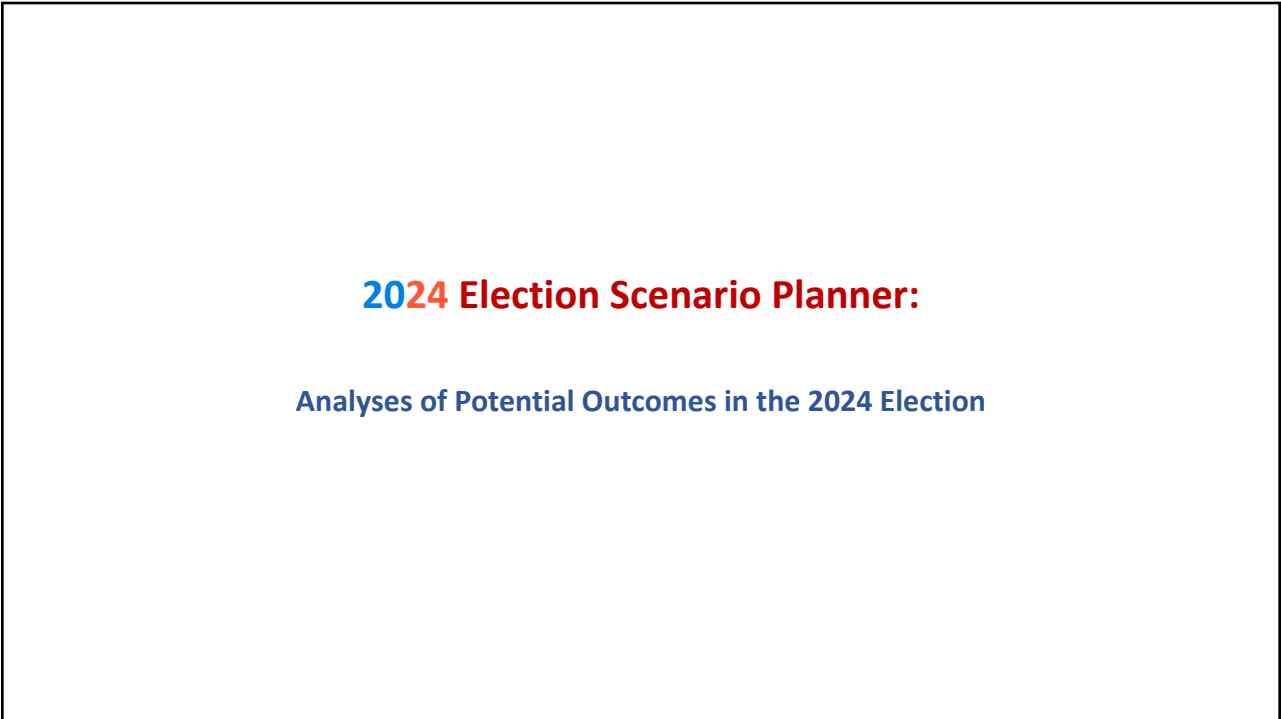
