The 10 Commandments of 2024 – How'd These Fare?

- 1. Presidential Approval: +/- 41, 42%?? (as reported by Gallup.com) STILL GOOD
- 2. The Electoral College (EC) Rule / Demo. Roll-off / ONLY 270 matters: NO CHANGE
- 3. We LIKELY STILL see a close race (NO Democratic Candidate has received more than 53% of the Popular Vote since 1964) STILL GOOD
- 4. Economic "growth" and the pocketbook and consumer sentiment; STILL GOOD
- 5. Social upheaval and protest politics vs. changes w/ pandemic politics? UNCLEAR
- 6. Abortion & aftermath of Dobbs?; LIMITED EFFECT(S)
- 7. Crime & the de-fund, fund the police movements, cannabis legalization; BACKLASH AG. BLUE?
- 8. Gender Identity controversies as a proxy for the "culture wars;" CRT (Critical Race Theory), think DeSantis in FL, Abbott in TX; BACKLASH AG. BLUE?
- 9. Who votes? When do they vote? How do they vote? WAYYY OFF − TURNOUT ↓
- 10. Some areas (Counties!) of the country matter more than others...STILL GOOD

The Big Picture: The Aftermath of a GOP Political Resurrection & a Monumental Democratic Loss

- "The BIG Picture:" 107 days & more than \$1 billion dollars (\$94.7 million / day!)
- TWO SIMPLE, KEY EARLY INDICATORS: "The Right / Wrong Direction"
 + Presidential Approval Numbers and here; + add to this TURNOUT

2 + 1?

- TOP LINE ANALYSIS: Trump won across-the-board and revived his political fortunes, crafting a new GOP / Trump majority; Harris closed gaps, yet wasn't a "change" candidate; Fundamentally was this a "historic realignment" of the vote? This is also far more than a structural EC advantage of Trump.
- Debate didn't matter; VP selection didn't matter; more money didn't matter; MESSAGE of "CHANGE" did.



More on The Big Picture, cont'd 2 + 1?

- "Inflation is the human wrecking ball of democracies...when inflation is high, the part in power loses."
- There were elections all over the world in 2024;
- TOP LINE ANALYSIS: <u>In every single democracy</u> that held an election this year – if inflation had risen in the last 12 months?

EVERY SINGLE RULING PARTY LOST. EVERY SINGLE ONE.

 Democrats have to speak better with those that shower after work, not prior to going to work."



How is 2024 a Continuation of Recent Trends?

- The 2024 elections represented more than Donald Trump's White House victory, Republicans' winning a majority in the Senate, and the GOP being in the driver's seat to keep the House (though control of that chamber is still up for grabs).
- 2024 culminated in the nation's sixth straight "change" election, in which *either* the White House or at least <u>one</u> chamber of Congress switched party control.

Continuation of Recent Trends?, cont'd

 Just look at this history of recent presidential and midterm election cycles:

2014: Republicans win the Senate

2016: Republicans win the White House

2018: Democrats win the House

2020: Democrats win the White House and the Senate

2022: Republicans win the House

2024: Republicans win the White House and the Senate

• In fact, you have to go back to the 2012 cycle for the last "status quo" election, where the White House and the two chambers of Congress didn't change party hands.

How Sweeping Was Tuesday for Trump & the GOP?


A historic shift of a powerful return by Trump who will dominate our political landscape;

Political comeback of massive proportions;

Gains across, up, and down the ballot; Across all levels and was both wide and deeper than in 2020 and 2016;

A political resurrection reflecting a deep divide, yet also dramatic shifts;

Profound policy and political shifts as a result;



Changes, Shifts in 2024

Trump was backed by a remarkable 1 in 3 voters of color (NBC News exit poll);

Trump <u>improved</u> over 2020 among voters younger than 30, Black voters, & Hispanic voters;

Biden won Latino men by 23 points (2020); Trump won them by 10 points in 2024 (see <u>CNN</u>).

There Were Four Possible Election Scenarios

The Four Possible Scenarios:


Republican sweep: Trump, with a Republican House and Senate, would institutionalize the MAGA movement, with massive consequences for governance, civil rights, and international relations;


Democratic sweep: Harris with a Democratic House and Senate (the least likely scenario, since the GOP looks likely to flip the Senate) would bring a progressive push across virtually every sector;


Trump with handcuffs: If a President Trump were constrained by Democratic control of at least one chamber of Congress, Washington would plunge into an epic power struggle and gridlock.


Harris with divided government: If President Harris faced a Republican Senate and/or House, she'd have to govern like a more moderate version of President Biden.



Below the National Level, Cont'd

Shifting state level control & emphases;

Into Election Day, the GOP controlled 56 leg. Chambers; Dems controlled 41;

After Tuesday? GOP flipped MI House & PA House. GOP also moved into a tie in MN House (pending recounts here).

The U.S. Presidency Transition Process

68 Days to Go – Until Inauguration Day

- Donald Trump won a clear victory in the 2024 presidential election; the Trump transition team now has ten weeks to put together his Administration.
- The presidential transition process in the United States stands almost alone among democracies. Most democratic governments move quickly to install new leaders once they are elected. In the United Kingdom, for example, the new Prime Minister takes office the morning after the election.
- The United States waits two-and-a-half months.

The U.S. Presidency Transition Process, cont'd

- Yet, the U.S. presidential transition differs from other democracies in a second important way:
- In most democracies, only the most senior officials leave alongside the departing leader. Most of the government remains behind;
- When U.S. Presidents depart, however, not only does the White House staff depart with them, but so do Cabinet Secretaries, <u>Deputy Secretaries</u>, <u>Under Secretaries</u>, and <u>Assistant Secretaries</u> as well—along with a host of political appointees.
- Why does this matter?

The U.S. Presidency Transition Process - CHALLENGES

- Previous Transition in 2017 was very different:
 - Recall Trump <u>fired the head of the transition effort</u>, Chris Christie, immediately after the 2016 election; throwing out the work that was done; had done;
- Yet this could still be bumpy how so? Two Reasons
- One challenge is that the world situation is more dangerous than it has been in decades. Events could push the Biden administration to make decisions that the Trump team will see as tying their hands. Iran and Israel is one but one example;
- This leads to a <u>bevy of news stories</u> that the Biden administration is seeking to "<u>Trump-proof</u>" its policy initiatives, leading to further distrust between the two camps, complicating a coordinated transition.

The U.S. Presidency Transition Process – CHALLENGES 2

- A challenge is the fact that presidential transitions are a delicate dance;
- The outgoing President is the only person charged with the powers of the office;
- Yet, Presidents-elect and members of their team can be tempted to get a head start on their agenda;
- Trump experienced this problem eight years ago when his pick for national security advisor, Michael Flynn, sought to meddle in U.S. policy toward Russia in the waning days of the Obama administration;
- Moreover, Trump <u>said repeatedly</u> on the campaign trail this time around that he will settle the war in Ukraine before he takes office.
- Yet, any pronouncement Trump makes, whether public or private, could be read as signaling that he is speaking on behalf of the United States.
