Bruce Springsteen: America's Rock and Roll Laureate Instructor: Pete Elman

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
"I saw rock n' roll future and its name is Bruce Springsteen" - Jon Landau, 1974.

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
Writing a Legacy Letter | Instructor: Jay Sherwin

This workshop introduces the concept of "legacy letters" and encourages participants to craft their own legacy document. A legacy letter (also called an "ethical will") is a written document that allows people to share their life lessons, express their values and transmit their blessings to future generations. A legacy letter is typically just a few pages, a rewarding experience that creates an enduring gift for children, grandchildren, and other loved ones. Discussion and brief writing exercises will help participants explore their values and capture important insights. Advice, encouragement, and a model structure is provided to help participants draft and complete their own legacy letter.

The intertwining knot Leonardo invents tells the story of a hidden message unlocked by Cocciardi and revealed in Mona Lisa's embroidery pattern.



Right on East Cotati Avenue to Main Entrance of the campus on your right. Information Booth is straight ahead (purchase parking passes).
