Paint It Black: A Deep Dive into Black Art

If asked, most of us could name several Impressionist artists without trouble. Yet, I bet many of us would be hard-pressed to name 10 Black artists, whether American or of another nationality, within the African diaspora. This course will look at early depictions of Black people in Western art and examine some of the earliest Black American artists and those of the present day. We'll explore the Great Migration and its role in the Harlem Renaissance. We'll look at the lesser-known but equally important Harmon Foundation and the Chicago Institute of Art, and their roles in promoting Black art and artists. Join in on the fun as we enjoy examining and discussing many great images.

The story of popular music is one of great singers—but it is also the story of great vocal groups. In this course, we will look at six different eras and genres and 24 legendary singing groups. From the early days of doo-wop through the more modern era of pop stars whose power, style and passion gave us hundreds of unforgettable records. This new course will share some secrets of what makes ensemble pop singing so special and emotional. With an emphasis on choral harmonies, unique vocal arrangements and unforgettable trademark songs, this course promises to be much more than a mere trip down Memory Lane.

Planets Around Other Stars: What We've Learned and Can We Go There?

We live in a unique age of planet discovery. In 1990, we knew of just nine planets. Now, we know of over 5,000! Experts estimate that our galaxy contains over 100 billion planets, with 9 billion being Earth-sized or smaller. These discoveries have led to a much deeper understanding of our own solar system, particularly new models of solar system formation. This course will survey what we currently know about exoplanets, including the different types, how they form, how we detect them, which ones are possibly habitable, and what the histories of planets in our solar system can tell us about them. Interwoven throughout the course will be a brief history of space travel and its current state, including the question, "Can we go there?"

West Meets East: How Japanese Art Influenced Western Modern Art

In the latter half of the 19th century, Japan held a profound fascination for Western artists. After centuries of self-imposed isolation, Japan opened to international trade in the late 1850s. As the island nation's art and culture became readily accessible to the West, a phenomenon known as "Japonisme" developed. The effects of the trend examined in this course were most pronounced in the visual arts but extended to architecture, landscaping, gardening and clothing. One of the leading Japanese art forms which transformed Impressionist and Post-Impressionist art were polychrome woodblock prints known as ukiyo-e or "pictures of the floating world."

The Cuban Missile Crisis: The 13 Darkest Days of the Cold War In October 1962, the Soviet Union, America and Cuba played a

high-stakes game of "chicken," with the survival of civilization resting on the outcome. When Russian Premier Nikita Khrushchev introduced offensive nuclear weapons into the newly established socialist "island of freedom," U.S. President John F. Kennedy felt he had no choice but to "take them out." The stage was set for the ultimate showdown. In this course, we will examine the background events leading up to the crisis of nuclear brinkmanship, the hair-raising 13 days of the standoff, and the final resolution of the madness.

Ancient Egypt

This course will examine ancient Egypt across three millennia, from the primordial mound of creation to the Old Kingdom pyramids to Cleopatra's fatal embrace of an asp. We will share hundreds of delightful frescoes of loving families, beloved animals, and the cheerful dead. We will meet pharaohs, gods and mummies. We will explore temples, read hieroglyphics, and understand why the Egyptians were ever-thankful for the sun's fertile eye and the Nile's birthing waters.

Terrorism, Violence & The Law

This course covers one of today's most pressing issues—the prosecution and execution of violence to create "terror." History provides numerous examples of groups attempting to change their living conditions, with many who cannot alter their environment through peaceful means resorting to various forms of political violence. Guided by scholarly literature, this course develops a better understanding of the nature of terrorism; the spectrum of terrorist motivations, strategies and operations, including the sociopolitical, economic and other factors that create environments enabling terrorist group activities; and the means governments use to combat contemporary forms of terrorism.

The Fall of Rome

The fall of the Roman Empire has fascinated the public for generations.

Hundreds of theories have attempted to explain it, ranging from barbarian invasions to Christianity. But these explanations often raise more questions than they answer. How could illiterate barbarians destroy an advanced society with indoor heating and plumbing, long-distance trade, banking and a complex political system that had endured for centuries? Did other factors, such as environmental change and illness, contribute to the end of Roman rule in the west? And what, if anything, can the fall of Rome tell us about our current political circumstances? In this course, we will explore these and related questions together.

The History of American Women Spies during WWII

This course will focus specifically on American women spies since much has already been written about French and British women spies. We will learn how ordinary housewives were recruited to become spies, which classes were taught at Camp X in Ontario, Canada, for Basic Training Spy School and which advanced classes were taught at Finishing Spy School in Beaulieu, England. This course will also review the job of the intelligence officer who recruited and deployed female agents and the biographies of American Women Spies and their missions. The lecture includes many historical photographs of American women spies and their missions.

I Adore You: A Brief History of Romance

Some say the French invented love. This course proposes that women invented romance, in which she becomes both the object of desire and the author of her desires. This lecture will explore the history of romance, from the first portrait drawn by a lovesick Greek woman in antiquity, yearning for her lost warrior lover, to the cabaret music of Edith Piaf in the 20th century. Images, literary texts and love letters will allow us to enjoy the yearnings, passions and grief of love declared, desired and lost, all wrapped up in the beauty of romance. By exploring the topic of romance, we have yet another avenue for examining the

integral role that women have played in the development of human culture and society.
